The corner of King Street and Market Street in Leesburg, Virginia has served as the judicial center for Loudoun County since the mid-eighteenth century. Formed from Fairfax County in 1757, Loudoun County is privileged to have most of its court records since its formation. This is due to the efforts of George K. Fox Jr., Clerk of the Court during the Civil War, who removed all of the records and saved them from destruction. Today, the Historic Records & Deed Research Division indexes, flat-files, and scans documents to make the records more accessible to researchers, and to preserve Loudoun's history for future generations.
